Do you ever notice yourself hearing or reading something and being confused by it? I watch these little, short video snippets on my phone. They will say sensational things to get you to click or tap on them in order to get you in this doom scroll of views and advertising. And after watching, I am often left confused. The confusion comes because the context isn't clear. You can take a snippet or clip of an event or idea but really it doesn't give you full understanding, and that's without people editing for agendas and sensationalism. And speaking of that, we also have to be aware of bad actors as some would call them. They will try to manipulate your dopamine hit for their agenda and lead you into confusion.

This contextual confusion can be true of scripture as well. St. Paul tells the Ephesian Elders in Acts 20 that he shared the whole counsel of God with them. He didn't leave out anything so that they may watch over the flock of God and to guard against the people that will come into the church to devour and destroy and even among themselves will arise those who will twist the word of God.

We are exhorted to know the whole counsel of God, so we are able to see when things are out of context and being twisted. Sometimes we will see examples of where a word is used in book of the bible, and we assume it must be the same in another book. And this is not always the case. Baptism by definition means to immerse in water. Yet Jesus uses it to refer to being immersed in fire and suffering. He uses it to mean being immersed by the Holy Spirit. St. Paul was baptized in a house in Damascus with no tub or full immersion that we know of. Instead of taking these as the totality and applying the same meaning to the word in every instance the context of the passage around it matters, it will guide us on what is being spoken of.

For example, Jesus is tempted in the desert by Satan. He quotes scripture at Him taking the one-off bible memory verse technique. And Jesus fires right back because He understands the context of the scripture. Is there value in memory work? Certainly, but do not neglect the context in which the verse rests. Jesus shows us in that resistance to Satan that he understands the passage Satan is quoting but in the much larger context of scripture and faith. He knows that God would never tell you jump off a building to injure yourself.

Another confusing example is the word "body." We often find in scripture that church is called the body of Christ. And it is, however, when Christ is instituting His supper, He is not referring to the church or anyone of us. That had not been established. In the sacrament, He is referring to His own actual self. He gives himself for the forgiveness of sins; He gives His blood for the cost of our iniquities. The church as in His body on earth after His ascension does not give of themselves like Jesus does. The church is to do the labor of spreading the gospel and sharing the sacraments which He gave.

In another example, the church is also called the bride of Christ as in His wife, yet not in an earthly carnal way. But in the sense that He died for her, loves her, and puts her first. It takes no stretch to see how far off base a person can find themselves when they do not know the context. The context of these ideas and words matter. And to mix them is to get the word of God twisted.

Let us heed the warning of Paul in Acts and stick to the whole Counsel of God.



"Later that night, the boat was in the middle of the lake, and he was alone on land." Mark 6:47 (NIV)

When life gets messy, it can feel like our Messiah has gone missing.

That's exactly the kind of situation we find Jesus' disciples in as we read Mark 6. Right after Jesus miraculously fed 5,000 people, the 12 disciples got in a boat to travel to their next city. But strong winds caused the water to get very rough. The disciples were "straining at the oars" as the realities of life beat against them (Mark 6:48, NIV).

A deeper study of the Greek word *basanizo* (pronounced *bas-an-id-zo*) that is translated as "straining" in Mark 6:48 reveals just how distressing their circumstances were. *Basanizo* can also mean "to torment." It's a word we see used in the context of the torment caused by disease in Matthew 8:6 and demon possession in Mark 5:7. Mark clearly wanted to emphasize the serious turmoil and struggle these men were facing.

This storm was terrifying for them. The waves weren't just cresting and crashing like you've probably seen if you've ever been in rough waters. These waves were exploding all around them in unpredictable ways. They couldn't brace themselves or their boat. They were completely helpless and swallowed up by fear. I certainly can't blame them for being afraid at that moment. Sometimes it's hard not to be completely consumed by fear.

How thankful I am that even when our storms cause us to lose sight of hope, Jesus never loses sight of us!

While the disciples were in the boat straining, Jesus was on the mountainside praying. From where He was, Jesus saw the disciples in the middle of the lake. "Later that night, the boat was in the middle of the lake, and he was alone on land. He saw the disciples straining at the oars, because the wind was against them" (Mark 6:47-48a, NIV).

Take note of Jesus' response to the disciples, who cried out in fear, not faith, when He walked toward them on the water. The Scripture says "immediately" He spoke to them and said, "Don't be afraid" (Mark 6:50, NIV). He didn't criticize them for being afraid. He climbed into the boat with them.

He's saying the same thing to you and me. He's not running from us in our fears. He's climbing in to be right there with us. With His presence comes peace. The same God who willingly revealed Himself to people in the Bible wants to reveal the fullness of His peace and the power of His presence to us as well.

In the midst of whatever hurts and heartbreaks you're facing today, I pray you will see Him. Friends, the Lord is near. We are safe. We are loved. We are seen.

Lord, instead of being so terrified in the midst of what we don't understand, help us keep this picture of You watching us and always being with us. May we find courage in the assurance that You will come to us with Your miraculous presence. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

### What is Oktoberfest?

Oktoberfest is the world's largest folk festival held yearly in Munich, Germany. It began in 1810 when Bavaria's Crown Prince Ludwig married Theresa of Saxony. The townsfolk held a party in a large field outside the city to celebrate, and it was so popular they held it again a year later. The same field has hosted the festival ever since and came to be named "Theresienwiese" or "Theresa's Meadow" in English. The rest, as they say, is history. It is, without a doubt, the largest festival in the world. It regularly draws over six million people through its sixteen-day run.

Although called Oktoberfest and originally beginning on October 12<sup>th</sup>, the festival date was changed to September in 1872 to take advantage of better weather. To determine when the festival begins in any year find the first Sunday in October and count back fifteen days to the starting Saturday.

For many people, the only reason for the festival is beer, but drinking is not the only thing to do at Oktoberfest. The Oktoberfest grounds are over 100 acres and host a dazzling array of "bier" tents, food stands, carnival rides, games and more. Many families enjoy taking the children to Oktoberfest and, in fact, Tuesdays at the festival are family days with reduced food, beer and ride prices.

That is the background for the festival we at Saint John celebrate. However, our emphasis is not on beer but rather on mission work and spreading the love of Jesus throughout Hattiesburg and the world beyond. Our festival is held on the first Saturday in October which this year is October 5th. It is a lot of work and requires all hands-on deck. If you have not been contacted about working for Oktoberfest, please speak to Jennifer Blair, Mark Keyl, call the church office, or sign up on the lists when they appear. We always need help preparing and serving the food, baking for the delicatessen, and setting up and cleaning up. There is a spot for your talent!
